Well done, Prayan! Keep up the fantastic work!




EXCITING ADDITION TO STUDENT RECREATION TWO NEW FUSS BALL TABLES INTRODUCED
















STUDENTS SHINE AT THE ANNUAL INTERHOUSE SPELLING BEE COMPETITION

STUDENTS STEP UP FOR PREFECT INTERVIEWS: FUTURE LEADERS IN ACTION



BIOLOGY DEPARTMENT CONDUCTS INTERNAL TRAINING ON ICT IN BIOLOGY




